Preparedness Plan Introduction

Governor Whitmer's Executive Order 2020-142 "provides a structure to support all schools in Michigan as they plan for a return of pre-K-12 education in the fall. Under the order, school districts must adopt a COVID-19 Preparedness and Response Plan laying out how they will cope with the disease across the various phases of the Michigan Safe Start Plan. In turn, the accompanying Michigan Return to School Roadmap offers a guide to the types of safety protocols appropriate during each phase. There's no one-size-fits-all solution: What works in Lansing may not work in Sault Sainte Marie. Districts will retain the flexibility to tailor their instruction to their particular needs and to the disease conditions present in their regions." (EO-2020-142)

Each district (public, public school academy (PSA), nonpublic, and intermediate school district (ISD) that educates pre-K-12 students) shall submit a single completed Assurance Document and Preparedness Plan to its Board in time for approval by August 15 or seven days before the first day of school, whichever comes first. This template, when completed, serves as a single Assurance Document and Preparedness Plan.

The Preparedness Plan will be collected by the Intermediate School District for public school districts, the authorizing body for public school academies, or the chief/designated school administrator for nonpublic schools for transmission to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction and State Treasurer by August 17, 2020. Additionally, this Preparedness Plan must be posted on the district's/PSA's, or nonpublic school's public website home page no later than August 17, 2020. A single application should be filed by the district rather than multiple applications for individual schools within a district.

Preparedness Plan Assurances

Manchester Community Schools agrees to meet all of the following requirements of Executive Order 2020-142

- ✓ Manchester Community Schools assures that when it provides in-person instruction to its students without disabilities, Manchester Community Schools will also provide in-person instruction to its students with disabilities, consistent with their individualized education programs (IEPs).
- ✓ Manchester Community Schools assures that when schools are closed to in-person instruction, districts must strive in good faith and to the extent practicable, based upon available resources, technology, training, and curriculum, as well as the circumstances presented by COVID-19, to provide equal access to any alternative modes of instruction to students with disabilities from birth through age 26. This assurance includes the provision of auxiliary services under section 1296 of the Revised School Code, MCL 380.1296.
- ✓ Manchester Community Schools assures that while any state of emergency or disaster-related to the COVID-19 pandemic continues, it shall comply with guidance from the United States Department of Education, including its Office of Civil Rights and Office of Special Education and Rehabilitative Services, and the Michigan Department of Education concerning the delivery of alternative modes of instruction to students with disabilities in light of the impact of COVID-19.
- ✓ Manchester Community Schools assures that it shall, to the extent practicable and necessary, make individualized determinations whether and to what extent compensatory services may be needed for students with disabilities in light of the school closures during the 2019–2020 school year.
- ✓ Manchester Community Schools assures that during **Phase 1, 2, or 3** of the *Michigan Safe Start Plan* it will close its buildings to anyone except: (a) District employees or contractors necessary to conduct minimum basic school operations consistent with a Preparedness Plan, including those employers or contractors necessary to facilitate alternative modes of instruction, such as distributing materials and equipment or performing other necessary in-person functions. (b) Food-service workers preparing food for distribution to students or their families. (c) Licensed child-care providers and the families that they serve, if providers follow all emergency protocols identified by the state.
- ✓ Manchester Community Schools assures that during **Phase 1, 2, or 3** of the *Michigan Safe Start Plan* it will suspend athletics, after-school activities, inter-school activities, and busing.
- Manchester Community Schools assures that during Phase 1, 2, or 3 of the Michigan Safe Start Plan it will provide for the continued pay of school employees while redeploying staff to provide meaningful work in the context of the Preparedness Plan, subject to any applicable requirements of a collective bargaining agreement.
- ✓ Manchester Community Schools assures that in **Phases 1, 2, or 3** of the *Michigan Safe Start Plan* it will provide for the continuation of food distribution to eligible students.
- ✓ Manchester Community Schools assures that during **Phase 4** of the *Michigan Safe Start Plan* it will prohibit indoor assemblies that bring together students from more than one classroom.
- ✓ Manchester Community Schools assures cooperation with the local public health department if a confirmed case of COVID-19 is identified, and agrees to collect the contact information for any close contacts of the affected individual from two days before he or she showed symptoms to the time when he or she was last present in school.

Preparedness Plan

Every district must develop and adopt a COVID-19 Preparedness and Response Plan ("Preparedness Plan") that is informed by Michigan's 2020-21 Return to School Roadmap ("Return to School Roadmap") from the COVID-19 Task Force on Education and Return to School Advisory Council.

Scenario-2: Hybrid Model

<u>Campuses allowed to offer in-person</u> mixed with virtural instruction.

- Students meet on a hybrid model using a combination of newly designed virtual learning and in-person instruction.
- Curriculum, taught by a certified MCS teacher, is adjusted to meet each student's needs and address grade level concepts.
- Implement health practices to keep students, families, and staff safe.
- Focus on social-emotional learning and mental health supports.

Scenario-3: All Virtual

MI Safe Start Plan Phase 1, 2, or 3



<u>Campuses are not allowed to open</u> <u>or there is an intermittent closure.</u>

- Students participate in a newly designed completely virtual learning program at home.
- Curriculum, taught by a certified MCS teacher, is adjusted to meet each student's needs and address grade level concepts.
- An all virtual learning program may also include courses provided by external online vendors with MCS teachers of record.
- Focus on social-emotional learning and mental health

<u>Intermittent Virtual</u>

Scenarios 1 and 2 will be built to quickly adjust to virtual learning, if needed, as outlined in Scenario 3.

<u>Önline Option</u>

Under all scenarios, students will have the option to enroll in an MCS facilitated complete online learning environment.

The district will continue to work closely with the Michigan Department of Education, state health officials, the local government, community leaders, families, and teachers to develop a Preparedness Plan that considers all aspects of how our school community might be affected by COVID-19 and the Governor's guidelines. Our scenarios must be flexible and able to be scaled up or down depending on local conditions. No matter our particular context or scenario, our mission is to prepare individual learners to realize the best version of themselves.

Over the summer, MCS teams will be reflecting on what best practices and lessons learned can be carried forward as we plan for the 2020-2021 school year. These teams will be working to provide details for each scenario. More fully detailed plans will be available August 3rd, 2020. Students/Parents will declare which option they choose and be required to commit to that option for the first 9 weeks of school (our first quarter of school). At that time, if Washtenaw County is still identified as a Phase 4, 5, or 6 area, they will be given the opportunity to switch to another option if they so choose.

To ensure a successful beginning of the 2020-2021 school year for all of our students (In-Person or Remote Learning), we will use the week of August 31st through September 4th for Orientation, Small Scheduled Class Meetings, Securing of all Technology Needs, and All Access Logistics.

Option #1

In-Person Instruction

Wednesday: MCS Web Experience for both In-Person and Remote Learning Students (Virtual Instruction)

- Recorded, direct Instruction will be offered asynchronously using the Google Classroom learning management system on these Wednesday mornings.
- Buildings will be closed for cleaning/sterilization. All In-Person students will be engaged from home with Virtual Instruction on these days. As virus conditions improve, we will move to a five day per week, in-person model, with no Virtual Wednesdays.

Option #2

Remote Learning / MCS Web Experience

Klager Elementary— Students given instruction from Manchester's experienced teaching staff. The courses will be designed to continue with our district's high academic standards and instructional methods to have a positive educational impact for our students using our Google Classroom platform as our district-wide Learning Management System. Both synchronous (live and direct instruction from our teachers) and asynchronous (recorded instruction from our teachers) will be features of the MCS Web Experience.

<u>Riverside Intermediate / Manchester Jr./Sr. High School</u>—Students will be utilizing a developed virtual instructional program and be monitored by the Manchester teaching staff using our Google Classroom platforms as our district-wide Learning Management System. Both synchronous (live and direct instruction from our teachers) and asynchronous (recorded instruction from our teachers) will be features of the MCS Web Experience. The coursework offered will provide students with content that will be required for the students to advance to the next grade level, and grades and student and staff grading and expectations will be in place.

Attendance and participation will be required.

This remote learning opportunity will be implemented to meet the needs of our students and families who believe this will be the best learning strategy for instruction during these challenging times.
